

Ginkgo biloba extract. The name suggests a health supplement having all sorts of benefits such as aiding in the reduction of anxiety and glaucoma, memory enhancement and much more. But did you know that the extract comes from an incredibly interesting, real tree called the Ginkgo biloba. This extract comes from the dried, fan shaped leaves of the tree by a method known as organic extraction. The Chinese have used this product for over 5000 years in traditional medicine.

Interestingly, the WSU Landscape Arboretum showcases a number of Ginkgo trees throughout the campus. In fact, according to a recent WSU Campus Tree Inventory, about 2% of the total tree population were found to be Ginkgo trees. This translates to about 36 individual Ginkgo biloba trees.

What is so interesting about this tree besides having purported health benefits derived from its leaves? Well, just about everything. The Gingko is one of the oldest living tree species on the earth dating back more than 270 million years. It was thought to be extinct only to be found in China in the 1700's.



This tree, considered to be a living fossil, is a slow growing tree that can live up to 3000 years! The Ginkgo is a distinctive looking tree with its fan shaped leaves, pyramidal shape, and the ability to grow in harsh urban conditions and that can tolerate heat, air pollution, salt, and restricted growing spaces. In the fall they display attractive, brilliant, yellow leaves that generally all fall quickly after the first good frost. Having survived over millions of years, it has learned how to adapt to an ever-changing planet.

The Ginkgo also has both male and female trees. That's where things get interesting. The male tree is the preferred tree for a landscape tree, while the female tree should be avoided since it produces large quantities of a tan-orange fruit that smell horrible, especially when they drop to the ground and burst open.

WSU has taken great pains to plant only the male Ginkgo trees on campus for obvious reasons, but sometimes unexpected things happen. During my working days as a WSU Groundskeeper, I often conducted tours of the trees on campus. On one occasion third graders from nearby Goodview Elementary School were viewing a Ginkgo tree. After stressing the importance of planting male trees, to my chagrin a young student spotted 2 or 3 fruits hanging from a so-called male Ginkgo. Up to this point, the over 20-year male Ginkgo trees had never fruited.

The fruit exhibited by the one tree was soon followed by fruit on nearly all the Gingko trees in the area (on the east side of Pasteur Hall). And each year the trees bore larger quantities of the putrid smelling fruit. So what was going on? Some suggested

suspicious experiments in Pasteur Hall were being conducted at night, others pointed to the sex chromosomes of the Ginkgo as being difficult to distinguish. Still other exports point to the record-breaking cold winter of '96 that was followed by a nasty cold April. Following that winter quite a few trees showed varying signs of stress. A much more plausible explanation came from Gary Johnson, retired Professor of Urban and Community Forestry at the University of Minnesota. He speculated that the trees were mislabeled at the nursery where they were grown. I have been a victim of this mislabeling in the past. It can happen very easily.

Believe whatever explanation you want, it doesn't change the fact that the Ginkgo biloba trees of WSU are providing students, staff and visitors an interesting topic for conversation.
